secured and have vulnerability management applied. I see now with GPS and AI there may be a day when they are fully autonomous.

Enough of the Cybersecurity professional in me and back to the shack. Although I have had more time to spend playing radio, the propagation gods for the most part have been uncooperative and sending solar storms. In fact, for the Worked All Europe (WAE) contest last month, I didn't put much effort into it with the way things were going and didn't make many contacts. I submitted my log, as you should, whether you make one (1) contact or thousands. Remember, it helps the person you contacted with their score and log-checking. The not-so-optimal band conditions have caused me to experiment with my SDRs more. If you are interested, I suggest you check out https://www.rtl-sdr.com which has a ton of information. I was able to read, report, and analyze data from my wireless weather devices, utility meters, alarm systems, tire pressure sensors and more. All the information out there is amazing if you look for it. It is October and At the September meeting I announced we are making a change in disseminating the monthly meetings information. Although you will still receive the email with the Zoom meeting link, going forward we will also include it in the NOARS Log. The monthly meeting links will also soon be posted on the NOARS Website. All stations will sign in/activate under K8KRG

You will be assigned a differentiator so you will be spotted separately (K8CCS/1) (day of POTA)

An organizing chart will be used to assign frequency bands (day of POTA). Find Connie, K8CCS and Bill, K2WJS to sign in and let them know which frequency and band you want.

Successful park activations have a total of at least 10 contacts per club, with no duplicates at the park. If 10

people are at the event, and each makes 1 contact, that's the 10 contacts needed for a successful club activation. If 10 people each make 20 contacts, that's 200 contacts.

Keep a log of your QSOs

Required ADIF Fields to properly score your QSO's:

- Park No. US-0020,
- QSO Date: YYYYMMDD
- Time: HHMM (UTC) Add 4 hours to current time
- Station Callsign use K8KRG
- Operator your call sign
- Band
- Mode SSB, FT8, etc.

All logs will be submitted by one person who will create and send the ADIF file for NOARS, K8KRG. Each operator and the club get credit for the contacts.

What to bring:

- Rig and gear. If you don't have them, come anyway.
- Table, portable cover
- Water, food, non-alcoholic beverage
- Be prepared for the weather rain, sun, sleet or hail

CARS CW Class this Fall

Digital Modes, FM and SSB are common communication modes that many of us use and enjoy every day. We may even operate RTTY sometimes. Have you ever considered learning Morse code? The first Morse code line was constructed by Samuel Morse between Baltimore and Washington, D.C. The first message was sent on May 24, 1844, and by 1861 the two coasts of the USA were connected by telegraph. Morse code is the first digital mode of communication. Being a binary communication mode, the carrier is either on or off. By sending a series of short and long carriers with the proper sequence and timing, the whole alphabet, numbers and punctuation can be communicated. Morse code or CW (continuous wave) is commonly used for identifying 2M repeaters, everyday QSO's on the amateur radio bands, and by the military. Primarily used on HF, CW uses significantly less band width (100-150Hz), as compared to SSB, which typically is 2,400-3,000Hz in width. This narrow bandwidth means that the CW signals can be heard in poor conditions when SSB just won't complete that tough contact. If you're hunting for WAS or DXCC, having another communication mode available increases your chances of achieving these goals. ARRL has certificates available for all kinds of CW accomplishments. Finally, the ARRL offers Code Proficiency Certificates for a small fee after you send in a one-minute solid CW copy from one of W1AW's qualifying runs. Endorsement stickers are available as you successfully copy higher speeds up to 40WPM. Here's a web link to get additional details. http:// /www.arrl.org/code-proficiency-certificate

CARS will be offering an 11-week CW class beginning of October through February. Metro (W8MET) and I will meet with the students every other week for 1 hour from 6:30-7:30PM to discuss technique and quiz you on your CW sending and receiving skills. Each class will introduce 4 new code characters for you to master. We ask the students to use their own key and oscillator, and to bring them to class. We will begin learning Morse code with straight keys, and then move on to iambic double paddles.

The cost for the class will be \$20 per student.

NOARS at IngenuityFest – A Great Experience for Those on Both Sides of the Display Table

NOARS had a table at the fest on Saturday, September 28 from 1-7 PM, located between NASA, with its Virtual Reality headsets and Tri-C's Youth Tech with robots, which drew people to the area. Approximately 50 people stopped at the NOARS table. Playing off the NASA theme, John and Paul explained how some people talk to astronauts via amateur radio using a handheld transceiver and a home-made tape measure Yagi antenna, like we use for fox hunts, which visitors to the table found intriguing. Often heard from some of those stopping at the table they would love to get into amateur radio, but it is such an expensive hobby. Some were surprised that they can get a license and start off with a cheaper handheld and antenna for less than fifty dollars. It was nice to hear stories about how someone's dad, other family members, or neighbor was a ham, and it always looked interesting.

Will handled a lot of the younger folks that came up, since they identified with him, and talked about cool radio stuff. Andrew talked to the over-30 folks, mentioning at times to parents how ham radio really applied to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) and highlighted group projects.

Eric and Elaine had pretty much the same experience, talking to people and letting them know what amateur radio is about. A number of folks were surprised that amateur radio still exits, which highlights how important it is to bring amateur radio to these sorts of events.

We learned a lot about that this first-time round. The Informative PR postcards were a good idea. (See the article about those elsewhere in this issue of the Log.) Next year we need to have attention grabbers, such as signs and flashing lights. Many people just passed by since we didn't have any of those things. People visiting the table need to handle and work items, homemade or otherwise. Plans are already being discussed for NOARS' involvement in IngenuityFest 2025.

Recipes From Ham Radio Meet and Greet

Remember all the great food at Ham Radio Meet and Greet in August? Here are some recipes from that feast. If you brought a dish to Ham Radio Meet and Greet and would like to have the recipe published, send it to Elaine, KC8FOS at ewilkinson1951@gmail.com. Actually, since NOARS is the originator of the Food Group net (Wednesday evenings at 7 PM on the NOARS repeater, 146.700) send in any recipes you'd like to share, and we will publish them. Some have quipped that they're not sure if we are a ham radio club with a food problem or a food club with a ham radio problem.

Corn, Bean, Pepper, and Quinoa Salad

Eric Hatfield's (KE8VZA) side dish at the Ham Radio Meet & Greet is easy to make.

Ingredients:

- 1 bag of frozen corn
- 1 can of black beans
- 1 red sweet pepper
- 1 green sweet pepper
- 1 cup quinoa
- approximately 1.75 cups water
- balsamic vinaigrette dressing

Directions:

In a saucepan, bring the quinoa and some water to a boil then remove from heat. Ratio is 1.75 cups of water to 1 cup of quinoa, usually. Let stand until it cools. Kinda like cooking rice. Cut peppers to desired size. I pretty much dice them. Drain and rinse the black beans. Combine the peppers, beans, and corn in a dish and add some dressing and stir it up. Not too much dressing, though. When the quinoa has cooled, combine some of the quinoa into the dish with the rest. The amount of quinoa to add is up to you. Stir in more dressing as desired.

Easy South of the Border Dip

Dan Cox's (KE8VYQ) appetizer is "very easy to make."

Ingredients:

1 pint Daisy Sour Cream

4 packages of cream cheese (Dan says Dollar General brand tastes better than Philadelphia brand in this recipe)

Two 16 oz. bottles of Ortega Medium Taco Sauce

Grated cheddar or other cheese, according to taste

Directions:

Let the Cream Cheese set out for a bit so it softens. Using an old-fashioned hand mixer, slowly mix the sour cream, cream cheese, and taco sauce so the taco sauce does not splash. Good with tortilla chips, especially Tostitos Restaurant Style Tortilla chips.

Lori Schlick's Awesome Mac and Cheese.

Ingredients:

2 cups uncooked elbow macaroni

10 1/2 ounces condensed cream of chicken soup

3 cups mild cheddar cheese, shredded

1 cup Swiss cheese, shredded

¹/₂ cup Miracle Whip. (May substitute with mayonnaise)

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream regular or light

1 teaspoon onion powder

 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon dry mustard powder

 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper

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Directions:

Boil macaroni according to directions to make them very al dente, at least 1-2 minutes less than directed on the bag. Drain and rinse under cold water. Combine all ingredients in a 4qt slow cooker and cook on high for 2 hours or low for 3 hours, stirring once or twice. Serve hot.

Notes

Pasta - Do not overcook the pasta, it should be very firm after boiling. Rinsing the pasta stops it from cooking. Cheese - Shred the cheese from a block, pre-shredded cheeses do not work as well. If you do not have Swiss cheese, you can use Gruyere cheese instead (4 cups in total). Cooking time - Check the pasta early, slow cookers can vary.

Elaine's Pulled Pork

Ingredients:

4-pound Pork butt or shoulder pork roast

¹/₄ cup Worcestershire sauce

2-4 teaspoons garlic powder, according to taste

2 teaspoons paprika

1/3 cup brown sugar

2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Directions:

Combine paprika, brown sugar, salt, pepper, and garlic powder.

Put pork butt or shoulder roast in a 6-quart crockpot, fat side up. Spread mixture on top. Gently pour Worcestershire sauce over roast. Some of the mixture will slide off. That's OK. Cook on low for 8 hours. Check for doneness at 4 hours. If not tender, cook for a bit longer. When done, remove pork to a platter. Pour cooking liquid from the crockpot into a saucepan and bring to a simmer. Simmer until it has reduced by half. While the liquid is simmering, pull the pork. Put the pulled pork into a serving dish and pour the reduction over it, and mix.

Ham Hide and Seek was a Good Learning Experience

Will, KE8WHM and Eric, KE8VZA looked for Sara, KC8KSU. They report that Ham Hide and Seek was fun and a different challenge than the typical fox hunt. It was more about communication than using your radio as well as a good lesson in being precise and descriptive, since searchers relied on clues from the hidden person. Participants talked about how the exercise simulated an impromptu search for somebody using what you'd likely have with you on very short notice. A map, compass, and HT were helpful. The opinion was that using Yagi antennas was not necessary for this event. It was a lot of fun being able to place a person on a map with basic questions.

Andrew (KE8WMS) and Will (KE8WHM) on Sunday, September 15



Interestingly, swans visited both duos. Apparently, the swans just showed up a couple of weeks before. Maybe we could say the alluring song came from the swans.


















Corey Brooks Goes Portable in a Foreign Country!
